#### 8:00 P.M. OPEN PUBLIC MEETING MINUTES

On January 27, 2022 at 8:01 P.M., the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Midland Park conducted a meeting at Borough Hall located at 280 Godwin Avenue as previously advertised, Agenda items for the meeting were listed on the Borough website. **Mayor Shortway** called the meeting to order, noting the date as January 27, 2022, and that there will be a 3-minute limit to each individual addressing the Governing Body during the Open Public portions of the meeting.

### **APPROVAL OF MINUTES:**

No Minutes for approval at this time.

## **OPEN TO THE PUBLIC:**

The **Mayor** opened the meeting to the public for general questions, concerns, and comments.

**Administrator/Clerk Martin** asked members of the public present and on the phone to speak at this time.

Liam McElwain, 42 Hiawatha Court – requested permission from the Mayor and Council to refurbish the sign and beautify certain areas at Veterans Memorial Park for his Eagle Scouts Project. Governing Body were all in favor.

A Motion from Councilwoman DeLuca, Seconded by Councilman Kruis to give permission to Liam McElwain to refurbish the area at Veterans Memorial Park for his Eagle Scouts Project.

No one else from the Public came forward.

## **LIAISON REPORTS:**

**Mayor Shortway** reported there were no mayoral meetings scheduled or attended in the month of January 2022.

### Council President Peet Board of Health/ Board of Education/Ridgewood Water

On January 24, 2022, **Council President Peet** attended the **Ridgewood Water** presentation conducted by the New Jersey Water Authority. **Council President** summarized their discussion and information that transpired. At the January 10, 2022 the Northwest Bergen Regional Health Commission meeting for the Board of Health, the **Board of Health** conferred the most vulnerable population ages were from 18 to 65. The Pfizer booster will be available at the Waldwick location in the month of February. The old Lord & Taylor building will become a megasite for testing and booster shots. On the January 18, 2022, **Council President Peet** was present at the Board of Education meeting. One of the Motions for Finance was a district board election approval for March 8, 2022. Voters will be able to choose to opt or not for \$5.25 million turf fields for the schools. A recent mailing from Congressman Josh Gottheimer on infrastructure opportunities, the Congressman summarized the areas of concern. Input from Midland Park and surrounding towns are requested.

### Councilman DeBlasio Recreation/Information Technology/Municipal Alliance

Kathy LaMonte, Recreation Director was approached by Arts Amble who would like to sponsor a three arts event in Midland Park. More information will follow. There were no **Board of Recreation** meetings for the month of January. For **Information Technology, Councilman DeBlasio** toured the Borough with Phil Scaglione. Mr. Scaglione reported on the two projects in progress: installation of security cameras at the Recreation Center and Borough Hall and the updating or replacing of employee's computers. Mr. Scaglione also stated his concerns of security of Borough buildings and a long-term plan if there was an emergency. **Municipal Alliance** reports progress.

#### Councilman Damiano Finance/Public Works/Chamber of Commerce

**Finance** reports progress. A meeting was held with Matthew Tauber, Supervisor of **Public Works.** Mr. Tauber showed the **Councilman** the two generators installed at the Fire House and the Recreation Center. The generators have been tested and are ready to run if there is a need. Through the winter months, the **Department of Public Works** has done a phenomenal job of filling potholes, collecting leaves, snow plowing, and Christmas trees pickup. The **Councilman** requested a contact person and their information for **Chamber of Commerce**. Wendy Martin, Borough Administrator will send the information to **Councilman Damiano**.

## Councilman Iannone Public Safety – Police/Property Maintenance/Personnel

**Property Maintenance** and **Personnel** there is progress. The **Police Department** had 569 calls for service which categorized as public service and community assistance. There were 25 motor vehicle violations given in the month of January. Two arrests were made on assault charges. Training session were completed by the Midland Park officers and these included: bias, digitalized motor vehicle records, access of security, and SWAT training.

## Councilman Kruis Planning Board/Building Dept/Fire Prevention/OEM

On January 24, 2022, the **Planning Board** had their meeting. Dunkin Donuts has been approved for occupying the old Friendly's site. The Councilman had a meeting with Mark Berninger, Building Inspector, where Mr. Berninger has researching a new software package for the building department. Several towns are involved in this project. There has been progress with the Eastern Christian School. They asked for some time and patience while they fix the traffic situation for pick up and drop off

times. Michael Rau, Fire Prevention/OEM states the inventory for the PPE is at a satisfactory level. The 2022 inspections have already begun and are moving along smoothly.

## Councilwoman DeLuca Public Safety – Fire/Ambulance/Library

The **Ambulance Corps** meeting was held on Monday, January 6, 2022 virtually. The report for December is as follows: total calls for December 2021 were 62 and 438 miles were driven. Total calls For Rig #588, there were 37 calls with 275 miles and Rig #589 were 20 calls and 163 miles. The ambulances had 8 refusals, 4 cancellations, 3 stand byes, 3 mutual aids in and 7 out. The Kentshire had a total of 4 calls and 38 total since May 2021. On January 12, 2022, the **Fire Department** held their monthly meeting. Fire reports were as follows: 14 calls and no mutual aid calls with a total of 190 in the year 2021. Project Santa was a success with more participants than last year. It was well received by the residents and children and will continue next year. The **Library Board's** meeting was held on Tuesday, January 19, 2022 both in person and on Zoom. The Board's Trustees were confirmed as the following: Julie Yohana - President, Annie Campbell – Vice President, Erin Ortandl – Secretary, Lauren Sikora, and members of the Library Board. The next meeting will occur Thursday, January 27, 2022. Catherine Dileo submitted updates and reports for the programs, children's activities, circulation, and the strategic plan.

### **ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT:**

Borough Administrator/Clerk Martin stated she received a traffic analysis for the streets: Vreeland Avenue, Franklin Avenue, and Erie Avenue. The total crashes in those areas were down 84%. Ms. Martin relayed the Special School Election information. The Mail-In Ballots will be mailed out by the County on January 28, 2022. There are 680 Mail-In Ballot voters registered in the Borough of Midland Park. Further information will be posted on the Borough's website and eblasted.

**WHEREAS,** pursuant to the Local Public Contracts Law, N.J.S.A. 40A:11-1 et seq. and P.L.2011, c.139, the governing body may delegate the power to award purchases, contracts and/or agreements through New Jersey State Contracts and/or Purchasing Cooperatives to which the Borough of Midland Park is a member; and

WHEREAS, in the interest of streamlining Borough operations and improving efficiency, it is the desire of the Mayor and Council to authorize the Purchasing Officer/Qualified Purchasing Agent (QPA) to approve purchases, contracts and agreements through New Jersey State Contracts and/or Purchasing Cooperatives, subject to provisions and requirements of the Local Public Contracts Law, N.J.S.A. 40A:11-1 et seq. and P.L.2011, c.139 below the \$44,000.00 threshold in individual purchases and the aggregate as defined by N.J.S.A. 40A:11-2(19); and

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Midland Park that the Purchasing Officer/Qualified Purchasing Agent (QPA) upon receipt of an identified need and direction from the Borough is hereby authorized to approve purchases, contracts and/or agreements through New Jersey State Contracts and/or Purchasing Cooperatives to which the Borough of Midland Park is a member without further action from Council, provided that funds are available to cover the expenditure; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, Purchase approvals made by the Purchasing Officer/Qualified Purchasing Agent (QPA) by virtue of the adoption of this Resolution shall be subject to the provisions and requirements of the Local Public Contracts Law, N.J.S.A. 40A:11-1 et seq. and that no amount of any contract shall be in excess of the bid threshold in a single purchase or the aggregate without express individual resolutions authorizing such cooperative purchases by contract number.

# **ORDINANCES ON INTRODUCTION:**

1. ORDINANCE #01-2022

"AN ORDINANCE TO EXCEED THE MUNICIPAL BUDGET COST OF LIVING ALLOWANCE AND TO ESTABLISH A CAP BANK WHEN THE COST OF LIVING ADJUSTMENT (COLA) IS EQUAL TO OR LESS THAN 2.5 PERCENT (N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.14)"

**BE IT ORDAINED,** by the Borough Council of the Borough of Midland Park, in the County of Bergen, New Jersey, as follows:

WHEREAS, the Local Government Cap Law, N.J.S.A 40A:4-45.1 et seq., provides that in the preparation of its annual budget, a municipality shall limit any increase in said budget to 2.5% or the Cost-of-Living Adjustment (COLA), whichever is less, over the previous year's final appropriations, subject to certain exceptions; and,

**WHEREAS,** N.J.S.A. 40A:45.14 provides that a municipality may, in any year in which the COLA is equal to or less than 2.5% increase its final appropriations by a percentage greater than the COLA, but not to exceed the 3.5% rate as specified in the law, when authorized by ordinance; and,

**WHEREAS**, the COLA for CY 2021 has been certified by the Director of the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs as 2.5%; and,

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A 40A:4-45.15a provides that a municipality may, in any year in which the

COLA is equal to or less than 2.5% may, when authorized by ordinance, appropriate the difference between the amount of its actual final appropriation and the 3.5% percentage rate as an exception to its final appropriations in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

**WHEREAS,** the Borough Council of the Borough of Midland Park, in the County of Bergen, finds it advisable and necessary to increase its CY 2022 Budget by up to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, in the interest of promoting the health, safety and welfare of the citizens; and,

**WHEREAS**, the Borough Council hereby determines that a 3.5% increase in the budget for said year, amounting to \$300,666.95 in excess of the increase in final appropriations otherwise permitted by the Local Government Cap Law, is advisable and necessary; and,

**WHEREAS,** the Borough Council hereby determines that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years.

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED,** by the Borough Council of the Borough of Midland Park, in the County of Bergen, a majority of the full authorized membership of this governing Body affirmatively concurring, that, in the CY 2022 budget year, the final appropriations of the Borough of Midland Park shall, in accordance with this ordinance and N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.14, be increased by 3.5%, amounting to \$8,891,151.49 and that the CY 2022 municipal budget for the Borough of Midland Park, be approved and adopted in accordance with this ordinance; and

**BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED,** that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

**BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED,** that a certified copy of this ordinance as Introduced be filed with the Director of the Division of Local Government Services within 5 days of Introduction; and,

**BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED**, that a certified copy of this ordinance upon Adoption, with the recorded vote included thereon, be filed with said Director within 5 days after such Adoption.

**BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED,** that any ordinances or parts of ordinances which are inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby repealed, but only to the extent of such inconsistencies.

This ordinance shall take effect at the time and in the manner provided by law.
