LIAISON REPORTS:

Mayor Shortway

Mayor Shortway attended the Mayors Meeting in Hackensack on April 11, 2023. There were 10 Mayors also present.

Council President DeLuca

Public Safety – Fire/Personnel/Library

Council President DeLuca stated since April 3, 2023 when the Fire Prevention Official was presented with an iPad that has the Codes system on it, the **Fire Department** has not received any preplans from the Fire Prevention Official inspections. The new Fire Department's rescue truck is the midst of having decals installed. On May 24, 2023 at 7:00 P.M., there will be a memorial service hosted by the Fire Department. Their next meeting will be conducted on May 10, 2023. The **Library's** statistics are once again up from last year by 6% and the building usage has increased by 45%. For a Gold Award, a member of the Girl Scouts will be fundraising for yard games to add to the collection of borrowed items. A grant application was applied to by the **Library**, and they would have notification by end of April and the funds distributed in early June 2023. Library Director Catherine Dileo reported on the Scavenger Hunt progress. Many local businesses will be donating to this activity, and it will be tied into the summer reading theme. Children's Librarian Miss Emily and School Librarian Christine Carr are working together to finalize details for the students' summer reading program. Movies on the lawn, Summer Concerts, and many other activities are scheduled for the coming months. Please see their website for their calendar of events.

Councilman Braunius was absent. No report given.

Councilman DeBlasio **Information Technology/Building Department/Municipal Alliance**
Councilman DeBlasio was absent. No report given.

Councilman Damiano **Finance/Public Safety – Ambulance/Fire Prevention**
Councilman Damiano was absent. No report given.

Councilman Kruis **Property Maintenance/ Public Works/Planning Board**
Councilman Kruis reported the Superintendent of the Department of **Public Works**, Matthew Tauber, had the following updates: the bleachers were moved to the new concrete pads at the High School, spring cleanups on Borough properties have been completed, thank you to Sietsma Landscaping for donating and planting around the Windmill, mulch has been spread at the Dairy Street and Wortendyke Park playgrounds, the 2023 sign list has been completed, both tennis courts have been pressure washed and cleaned, the fire alarm system at the Fire House and the Department of Public Works has been inspected and passed, the County Greenwood Avenue Culvert Project is nearly completed, and the Midland Avenue Culvert Project is steadily progressing. The **Councilman** did not receive a report from **Property Maintenance** John Torry. At the **Planning Board** meeting on April 17, 2023, Dunkin Donuts was notified that they did not build their parking lot according to the approved plans. Dunkin Donuts needs to provide proper drainage due to the discrepancy in the wall that was erected. Also, there was a matter with a neighbor's fence that was in question. These items need to be addressed before the business may open.

Councilwoman Peet **Public Safety – Police/Board of Health/Bd of Education/Ridgewood Water**
Councilwoman Peet updated the Governing Body for the **Police Department's** statistics. In the month of March 2023, there were 743 calls for service. A total of 211 calls were categorized as Public Service: Community Service, Assist Citizen and other similar assignments and requests. Two persons were arrested for assault and cyber stalking. On April 25, 2023, the **Board of Education** held their monthly meeting. The **Councilwoman** stated there were standard motions such as: personnel, finance and curriculum. The May 23, 2023 meeting with the Board of Education will consist of playing fields, the Special Resource Officer Program, and the costs associated with services provided. **Councilwoman Peet** attended the Joint Insurance Fund meeting; the attendees were informed their fund has a reserve of \$140 million. The NorthWest Bergen Health Commission has reported the amount of grants they are receiving is very promising. Surrounding communities have been inquiring about joining the Commission. On April 26,

2023, Ridgewood Water conducted a meeting updating all municipalities involved on the lead pipe project. Ridgewood Water has asked all its residents to conserve water in order to keep the water provided PFAS free. Borough Administrator/Clerk Wendy Martin reported the procedures Ridgewood Water takes to control water conservation and the actions they take with offenders.

ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT:

Borough Administrator/Clerk Wendy Martin stated, she and Superintendent of Public Works Matthew Tauber have been working with PIA, the Borough's Risk Managers, on Midland Park's assets and property schedules. Ms. Martin is continuing to collaborate with the Borough's auditors and their requests for information to finalize the audit. **Mayor Shortway, Councilwoman Peet** and Ms. Martin attended the JIF breakfast, where Midland Park was awarded the Silver Award for the Safety Program. Borough Certified Financial Officer Laurie O'Hanlon and Ms. Martin have been working together on the Health Insurance Fund (HIF) BMED evaluation and it is almost completed. An update will follow. A resident from Ridgewood called Ms. Martin concerning a sign in Midland Park. The sign was old and faded. Mr. Tauber replaced it right away since it was already on the 2023 sign replacement list. Chief Michael Powderley, Sgt. Noah Van Vliet and Ms. Martin are deciding of the placement on pedestrian beacon signs on Godwin Avenue. Dunkin Donuts will be contacted to request contributing to the price of the signs. At the request of **Councilwoman Peet**, Ms. Martin directed Sgt. Noah Van Vliet to research the flashing stop signs in Waldwick for placement at the Erie and Franklin Avenues intersection in Midland Park. The Borough participated in a class action lawsuit and received a check in the amount of \$17,414.00.

1. ORDINANCE #12-2023

"AN ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE VARIOUS MUNICIPAL IMPROVEMENTS, ACQUISITIONS AND PROJECTS IN THE BOROUGH OF MIDLAND PARK, TO APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$135,000.00 TO PAY THE COST THEREOF, FROM THE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT FUND."

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Borough Council of the Borough of Midland Park, in the County of Bergen, New Jersey as follows:

Section 1. The following is to be funded from the Capital Improvement Fund and is hereby authorized for:

- 1. Fire**
Purchase Turnout gear
- 2. Department of Public Works**
2023 Road Resurfacing projects
Reserve for Drainage projects
- 3. Building & Grounds**
Reserve for future building renovations

Section 2. The sum of \$135,000.00 hereby appropriated to the payment of the cost of such acquisitions and improvements authorized and described in Section 1 hereof. Said sum so appropriated shall be met from the Capital Improvement Fund of the Borough.

Section 3. Said improvements are lawful capital improvements of the Borough having a period of usefulness of at least five (5) years. Said improvements shall be made as a general improvement, and no part of the cost has been nor shall be assessed against property specially benefited.

Section 4. The capital budget is hereby amended to conform with the provisions of this capital ordinance to the extent of any inconsistency therewith and the resolutions promulgated by the Local Finance Board showing full detail of the amended capital budget and capital program as approved by the Director, Division of Local Government Services, is on file with the Borough Clerk and is available for public inspection.

Section 5. This ordinance hereby incorporates the provisions of N.J.S.A. 40A:2-20.

Section 6. This ordinance shall take effect at the time and in the manner provided by law.

Resolution #084-2023 National Day of Prayer

WHEREAS, Civic prayers and national days of prayer have a long and venerable history in our constitutional republic, dating back to the First Continental Congress in 1775; and

WHEREAS, The Declaration of Independence, our first statement as Americans of National purpose and identity, made "The Laws of Nature and Nature's God" the foundation of our United States of America, and asserted that people have inalienable rights that are God given; and

WHEREAS, The Supreme Court has affirmed the right of state legislatures to open their sessions with prayer, and the Supreme Court and the U. S. Congress themselves begin each day with prayer; and

WHEREAS, in 1988, legislation setting aside the first Thursday in May in each year as a National Day of Prayer was passed unanimously by both Houses of Congress and signed by President Ronald Regan; and

WHEREAS, The National Day of Prayer is an opportunity for Americans of all faiths to join in united prayer to acknowledge our dependence on God, to give thanks for blessings received, to request healing for wounds endured, and to ask God to guide our leaders and bring wholeness to the United States and her citizens; and

Resolution #086-2023 2023 Open Space Project Dairy Street Recreation Complex Parking Lots Enhancement

WHEREAS, the Bergen County Open Space, Recreation, Farmland & Historic Preservation Trust Fund ("County Trust Fund"), provides matching grants to municipal governments and to nonprofit organizations for assistance in the development or redevelopment of municipal recreation facilities; and,

WHEREAS, the **Borough of Midland Park** desires to further the public interest by obtaining a matching grant of **\$103,743.00** from the County Trust Fund to fund the following project, enhancements to the **Dairy Street Recreation Complex**; and,

WHEREAS, the governing body has reviewed the County Trust Fund Program Statement, and the Trust Fund Municipal Program Park Improvement application and instructions and desires to make an application for such a matching grant and provide application information and furnish such documents as may be required; and,

WHEREAS, as part of the application process, the governing body will hold a public hearing **May 11, 2023** to receive comments prior to the submission of said application(s); and,

WHEREAS, the County of Bergen shall determine whether the application is complete and in conformance with the scope and intent of the County Trust Fund; and,

WHEREAS, the applicant is willing to use the County Trust Fund in accordance with such rules, regulations, and applicable statutes, and is willing to enter into an agreement with the County of Bergen for the above-named project.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the **Borough of Midland Park**:

That it is hereby authorized to submit the above completed project application to the County by the deadline of May 12, 2023, as established by the County; and,

That, in the event of a County Trust Fund award that may be less than the grant amount requested above, the applicant has, or will secure, the balance of funding necessary to complete the project, or modify the project as necessary; and,

That the applicant is committed to providing a dollar-for-dollar cash match for the project and,

That the applicant agrees to comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, rules, and regulations in its performance of the project; and,

That this resolution shall take effect immediately.

Resolution #087-2023 Recycling Enhancement

WHEREAS, The Recycling Enhancement Act, P.L. 2007, chapter 311, has established a recycling fund from which tonnage grants may be made to municipalities in order to encourage local source separation and recycling programs; and

WHEREAS, there is levied upon the owner or operator of every solid waste facility (with certain exceptions) a recycling tax of \$3.00 per ton on all solid waste accepted for disposal or transfer at the solid waste facility.

WHEREAS, a municipality operates a municipal service system for solid waste collection or provides for regular solid waste collection service under a contract awarded pursuant to the "Local Public Contracts Law", the amount of grant monies received by the municipality shall not be less than the annual amount of recycling tax paid by the municipality, except that all grant moneys received by the municipality shall be expended only for its recycling program.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Council of the Borough of Midland Park hereby certifies a submission of expenditure for taxes paid pursuant to P.L. 2007, chapter 311, in 2022 in the amount of \$7,703.34. Documentation supporting this submission is attached and available at the Borough

Hall, 280 Godwin Avenue, Midland Park, N. J. 07432, and shall be maintained for no less than five years from this date.

Resolution #088-2023 2022 Tonnage Grant

WHEREAS, the Mandatory Source Separation and Recycling Act. P.L.1987, c.102, has established a recycling fund from which tonnage grants may be made to municipalities in order to encourage local source separation and recycling programs; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent and the spirit of the Mandatory Source Separation and Recycling Act to use the tonnage grants to develop new municipal recycling programs and to continue and to expand existing programs; and

WHEREAS, the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection has promulgated recycling regulations to Implement the Mandatory Source Separation and Recycling Act; and

WHEREAS, the recycling regulations impose on municipalities certain requirements as a condition to applying for tonnage grants, including but not limited to, making and keeping accurate, verifiable records of materials collected and claimed by the municipality; and

WHEREAS, a resolution authorizing this municipality to apply for such tonnage grants for the year 2023 will memorialize the commitment of this municipality to recycling and to indicate the assent of The Mayor and Council of the Borough of Midland Park to the efforts undertaken by the municipality and the requirements contained in the Recycling Act and recycling regulations; and

WHEREAS, such a resolution should designate the individual authorized to ensure the application is properly completed and timely filed.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the Borough of Midland Park that the Borough of Midland Park hereby endorses the submission of the recycling tonnage grant application to the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection and designates Bergen County Utilities Authority, Recycling Coordinator, to ensure that the application is properly filed, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the monies received from the recycling tonnage grant be deposited in a dedicated recycling trust fund to be used solely for the purposes of recycling.

ORDINANCES ON INTRODUCTION:

1. ORDINANCE #13-2023

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 34 OF THE CODE OF THE BOROUGH OF MIDLAND PARK ENTITLED “ZONING”. (Revocation of Zoning Certificate)

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Midland Park, in the County of Bergen, and State of New Jersey as follows:

Section 1.

Chapter 34 of the Code of the Borough of Midland Park, Zoning, §34-21.3, Zoning Certificate, be and is hereby amended to add the following:

j. Revocation of Zoning Certificate

1. Any person, corporation, partnership, firm or entity which has received a zoning certificate pursuant to this section and is subsequently determined to have violated the terms and conditions of the zoning certificate or has otherwise been determined to have violated any statute, ordinance or other provision pertaining to the use of the structure shall be subject to having the zoning certificate revoked by the Zoning Officer. Any party subject to such revocation shall have the right to appeal such revocation pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40:55D-70a.
2. A construction permit or certificate of occupancy for industrial use in the Industrial District shall also be subject to having the construction permit or certificate of occupancy revoked by the Zoning Officer if it is determined that the holder of the construction permit or certificate of occupancy has violated the terms and conditions thereof or has otherwise been determined to violate any statute, ordinance or other provision pertaining to the use of the structure. Any party subject to such revocation shall have the right to appeal such revocation pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40:55D-70a.

Section 2. Severability.

If any section, sentence or any other part of this Ordinance is adjudged unconstitutional or invalid, such judgment shall not effect, impair, or invalidate the remainder of this Ordinance but shall be confined in its effect to the section, sentence or other part of this Ordinance directly involved in the controversy which such judgment shall be rendered.

Section 3. Inconsistent Ordinances Repealed.

All ordinances or parts or ordinances which are inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed, but only to the extent of such inconsistencies.

Section 4. Effective Date.

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon final passage and publication as provided by law.

2. ORDINANCE #14-2023

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 8 OF THE CODE OF THE BOROUGH OF MIDLAND PARK ENTITLED "PARKING". (Municipal and Library Lots)

§ 8-2.1 Parking Restricted and Time Limited at Municipal Parking Facilities.

[Ord. #09-07 § 8-2.1]

No person shall park a vehicle without authorization and for longer than the time shown in the parking lots located at the areas described below:

Location	Restrictions	Maximum Time (if app.)
Midland Park High School, Highland School, Godwin School parking lots and the East Center Street parking lot/school bus facility	No parking from dusk to dawn except during school related activities approved by the Board of Education	
Recreation Area Parking Lots (Dairy Street and Wortendyke Park)	No parking from dusk to dawn except during recreational activities approved by the Board of Recreation


Raymond Chapman stated he was glad the bridge project is nearing its completion.
