Mayor Shortway opened the meeting to the public for any questions, comments, or concerns.

Administrator Seemon asked individual members of the Public if they would like to speak at this time.

Ester Vierheilig – 333 Godwin Avenue – called in to see how this works and commented that it is going well so far and congratulated the Governing Body for doing this

Councilman Sansone pointed out that **Councilman Iannone** is Present(connected) but unable to be heard. Administrator Seemon tweaked the system and **Councilman Iannone** was able to be heard.

Mike Junta – 151 Birch Street – thanked the Governing Body for everything they have done during this pandemic and reminded everyone to continue to stay safe

There being no further response, the **Mayor** closed the meeting to the Public.

OPEN TO THE PUBLIC HEARING ON THE 2020 MUNICIPAL BUDGET:

The **Mayor** opened the meeting to the public and Council for discussion on the 2020 Budget.

CFO O'Hanlon spoke of the amended budget and some of the details regarding how it was put together.

Councilman Kamp noted that given the extraordinary times and the impending financial hardship many will be facing, to keep the budget at 2.7% increase is like a zero-based budget. He thanked everyone involved for the outstanding effort in re-doing the budget.

Council President DeLuca expressed her thanks to the CFO on the work done to amend the budget

Ester Vierheilig – 333 Godwin Avenue – thanked CFO O'Hanlon for keeping the tax increase low given what we are going through

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LIAISON REPORTS:

Mayor Shortway

Mayor Shortway noted he had no report at this time.

Councilwoman Peet Finance/Board of Health

Councilwoman Peet reported progress for **Finance** and thanked the CFO and all involved in amending the budget.

The Councilwoman reported the Board of Health has been very busy with the coronavirus: there are 521 cases under investigation within the Board's jurisdiction excluding Mahwah, Montvale or Hillsdale. Councilwoman Peet noted there are a significant number of cases in Midland Park but there have been no deaths at this time. The case follow-up is time-consuming: they trace where the patient has been and all the information that they gather is entered into the Communicable Disease reporting system, which is overseen by the New Jersey Department of Health. There are six outbreaks in long term care facilities, none located in Midland Park, but within the Board's jurisdiction, which are monitored daily. The Board members have been fielding calls from Police Departments, First Responders, and the public. All staff has been working very diligently throughout this crisis and other aspects of the Board's role have been postponed until the virus situation eases. They continue to advise people to remain isolated, especially with the holiday coming, and continue to wear masks and gloves when going out into the public, continue social distancing, disinfect homes and washing hands is very important.

Council President DeLuca Public Safety – Fire/Ambulance/ Personnel/Library Council President DeLuca reported the Ambulance Corps answered 44 calls in March, bringing the

year-to-date total to 141 and all is well.

The **Council President** reported the **Fire Department** cancelled the regular monthly meeting, but she received a report from the Chief: the Department answered 12 calls for service in March and all is well. **Council President DeLuca** reported she was in touch with the **Library Board** President: the Library Director is back from leave and working from home. She remotely meets twice per week with the staff who are busy working from home. A member of the staff routinely checks in on the Library. The Board will hold a remote meeting on April 21st.

Councilman Kamp Recreation/Municipal Alliance/Ridgewood Water

Councilman Kamp reported the **Board of Recreation** has cancelled or postponed many activities but are accepting applications for Summer Camp-no money is being taken at this time, but spaces are being reserved with the hope of opening up this summer.

The Councilman reported the Municipal Alliance is still planning on sponsoring the prom bus. Councilman Kamp reported Ridgewood Water has issued an update on closures and protection for staff which is posted on their website.

Councilman Iannone Public Safety – Police/ Information Technology

Councilman Iannone commended the **Police Department** for all the hard work they have done and the dedication they have shown during this crisis, noting the Chief is working on initiatives, including bringing recently retired officers back to bolster the department as per the Governor's Executive Order #115. He thanked the Chief and the CFO for the work involved to amend the budget.

The **Councilman** commended **Information Technology** who has gone above and beyond with setting up the remote stations and the support for the staff who are working from home.

Councilman Kruis

Planning Board/Building Dept/ Fire Prevention/OEM/Property Maintenance

Councilman Kruis reported the Planning Board has not met due to the current crisis.

The **Councilman** reported the **Building** Department is still operating, doing work remotely.

He reported the **Office of Emergency Management** Coordinator is busy with keeping essential supplies such as masks and PPE's and disinfectants in stock.

Councilman Kruis reported all departments are doing well.

Councilman Sansone Public Works/ Board of Education/ Chamber of Commerce

Councilman Sansone reported the Department of Public Works has continued to work throughout the COVID-19 pandemic: they have completed spring cleanup of all Borough properties and have started on the fields; the recycling center has been open and social distancing guidelines are being followed. The Councilman noted the work on the new CVS building has continued and some road work will be started within the next week. The DPW has been disinfecting all the Police vehicles, keeping the officers safe. Councilman Sansone reported the Superintendent of the Board of Education has been sending out updates regarding the in-home schooling and any State orders applicable to the schools. For further details, please visit the Board of Education website.

The **Councilman** reported he has been exchanging information with the President of the **Chamber of Commerce** and they have arranged a meeting with State Assemblyman Chris DePhillips and State Senator Kristin Corrado regarding helping small businesses financially and in business.

ADMINISTRATORS REPORT

Borough Administrator Seemon reported he is proud of the emergency services members and the administrative staff for how they are handling this situation. He apologized for delays in following up with voicemails and he thanked all that were involved with amending the budget. He reminded everyone to continue with following the social distancing guidelines and to stay strong.
